Like most of our concert, these lyrics and music were written by women. Surprisingly few women are represented in the fields of Broadway, classical, and choral composition. This song, from the musical *Secret Garden*, is about the idea that there is hope even when times seem darkest.

Come in From the Firefly Darkness Amy F. Bernon

Our opening song is about enjoying the company of good friends after time spent apart and reflects how the Cumberland Singers feel coming to rehearsal at the start of each new season.

"And in the sweetness of the night, I will sing."

This piece is a choral adaptation of a poem by Sara Teasdale (1884-1933), who wrote the work to express her disillusionment over World War I. Teasdale's poem asserts that, despite human acts of foolishness, the earth will heal itself and go on.

"And spring herself, when she awoke at dawn, would scarcely know that we were gone."

This piece sets another four of Teasdale's poems to music, using compositional techniques like text painting, rhythmic variations, and lush chords to bring the words to life. The first poem, *Life has loveliness to sell*, encourages us to appreciate beauty in the everyday objects and experiences around us. The second, *To-night*, compares the eternal nature of the moon and sky to the fleeting moment of a love affair. The third poem, *Dusk in June*, ensconces the listener amidst a flock of singing birds. Finishing out the piece is *I would live in your love*, which paints a picture of ocean waves and heartbeats.

In explaining this song, Joan Varner describes a visit to the Nazi concentration camp in Auschwitz, Poland. She was struck by the loss of so many young lives and haunted particularly by the photo of one teenaged girl. She dedicates this song to that girl and to all young people whose lives are taken unjustly.

We Are the Ones We Been Waiting For Bernice Johnson Reagon

As sung by Sweet Honey in the Rock, We Are the Ones We Been Waiting For is the end of a poem by June Jordan, entitled Poem for South African Women. The poem was written as a tribute to successful protests against a proposed pass law for African women in 1955. The composer intended specifically for all seven parts to be balanced, cooperative and supportive – different, but complementary. The message is that we cannot wait for someone else to step up and take the action we should take ourselves.

"We are the ones we have been waiting for."

Evoking feelings about nature and human nature, the natural world and the supernatural world, *Angel Breathing Out* is a song of exhilaration and hope.

"What wind is it that blows here? What change is come about?"

Adapted from Dickinson's famous poem, this piece explores a simple but powerful idea: that perhaps there are nobler pursuits than fame for its own sake.
