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
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# **About the Director**

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



Also known as the *Carol of the Town Watchman*, this is, again, a traditional carol using the number three, and it happens to have way more verses than we will sing today. My favorite of the verses found goes like this: *Cheese from thy dairy, bring it for Mary. And not for money, butter and honey.* 

#### **Huron Carol**

#### trad. French folk song arr. Ed Henderson

Originally, this carol was written in 1641 to an old French tune by Jesuit priest Jean de Brebeuf, who was working as a missionary in Sainte-Marie in Canada among the Hurons. The English lyrics were written in 1926 by Jesse Edgar Middleton. Its intent was to tell the nativity story with words and concepts familiar to the Hurons at the time, and it even uses the Algonquian name for God, Gitchi Manitou.

# Rise Up, Shepherd, and Follow
