
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ABOUT THE CUMBERLAND SINGERS

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





Our opening piece is an example of the Lutheran chorale, which was a late 15th century addition to the Mass celebration by Martin Luther. The chorale was a religious hymn sung in four-part harmony by the congregation as part of the service. This particular anthem is from Bach's "Christmas Oratorio."

Ave Maria

Franz Biebl (1906-2001)

Solo: Ron Flory

Biebl's beautiful Ave Maria for double choir, composed in 1964 for a firemen's choir, was made popular with American choirs when it was recorded by the male a cappella ensemble Chanticleer, after which the composer arranged the piece for SATB as well as SSA choir.

Translation of the Latin: The angel of God visited Maria and she conceived of the Holy Spirit. Hail Mary, Full of grace, the Lord is with you. Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb, Jesus. Maria said, See the servant of the Lord. May it happen to me according to your word. And the Word became flesh and lived among us. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, Holy Mary, pray for us now and in the hour of our death. Amen.

Huron Carol

Traditional

This is the Nativity story told with imagery from the native Canadian tradition – the manger being a "lodge of broken bark," and the



shepherds being "hunter braves." The original words were written by 1643 by Jean de Brébeuf, a Jesuit missionary at Sainte-Marie among the Hurons in Canada. The tune is from a French folk song.
